Leslie was born at St Kilda on 26<sup>th</sup> June 1894, the son of Horace and Alice (nee Wilson) Chambers.

Leslie enlisted in the AN&MEF on 11<sup>th</sup> August 1914. He stated that he was single and gave his father at Ben Boyd road, Neutral Bay, as his next of kin. At the time of enlisting Leslie worked at Blexham and Chambers, Printers, with his father. On 18<sup>th</sup> August 1914 he was appointed second Lieutenant and promoted Lieutenant on 1<sup>st</sup> Jan 1915. In his letters he states that he spent time at Frederick Wilhelmshaven, Eitape and Angoram as well as Rabaul. He returned to Australia and had his appointment terminated on 6<sup>th</sup> Feb 1951.

On 7<sup>th</sup> May 1915 he was granted a Commission as a Lieutenant in D Coy, 17<sup>th</sup> Battalion, AIF. He departed Australia on 12<sup>th</sup> May 1915 aboard the THEMISTOCLES for the Middle East

Leslie landed on Gallipoli on 16<sup>th</sup> August 1915 and was evacuated on 10<sup>th</sup> Dec with frostbite, not returning to his battalion until 3<sup>rd</sup> Feb 1916.

On  $23^{rd}$  July 1916 Leslie was promoted Captain and on  $29^{th}$  of the same month he was killed at Pozieres.

Leslie is buried at the Gordon Dump Cemetery, Ovillers-La Boisselle, France and is remembered on panel 82 at the Australian war memorial, Canberra.
