Robert joined the AN&MEF on 11<sup>th</sup> August 1914 and stated on his attestation papers that he was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, was 34 years old, single, and a cook by trade. He gave his father, Robert Allan of 97 Viewforth St, Edinburgh, as his next of kin. He stated that he had previously spent 1 and a half years in the South African Constabulary.

Robert returned from Rabaul and was discharged on 4<sup>th</sup> March 1915, time expired, after 206 days service.

On 15<sup>th</sup> March 1915, Robert joined the 20<sup>th</sup> Battalion (B Company), Regimental Number 478. The battalion left Australia on 26<sup>th</sup> June 1915 aboard the BERRIMA for Suez. Together with the rest of the battalion, Robert arrived on ANZAC Cove on 27<sup>th</sup> August. On 14<sup>th</sup> September Robert contracted pneumonia and was hospitalised until 12<sup>th</sup> October when he returned to the Cove.

Shortly before the withdrawal from Gallipoli, Robert was wounded with a "Shell Splash to the face".

He remained with the battalion which left Alexandria on 18<sup>th</sup> March 1916 aboard the IGNOMA, arriving in Marseilles on the 25<sup>th</sup>. On 29<sup>th</sup> July he was appointed Lance Corporal and was again wounded on 15<sup>th</sup> November 1916, this time with a gunshot wound to the right thigh which required him to be evacuated, not rejoining his unit again until 25<sup>th</sup> June 1917, being immediately promoted, firstly to Corporal and then to Sergeant.

On 20<sup>th</sup> September 1917 Robert was wounded a third time, this time in the right leg. He was again hospitalised, not returning to his battalion until 2<sup>nd</sup> Feb 1918. Only back on the front two months, he was wounded for the fourth time, this time in the back with a bullet penetrating his lung. He returned to Australia aboard the GAIKA, leaving the UK on 8<sup>th</sup> November 1918, arriving in Sydney on 29<sup>th</sup> December. Robert was eventually discharged on 4<sup>th</sup> May 1920.
