

Christopher was born on 19th December 1887 at Drogheda, Ireland, to Bernard James Evers and his wife Ellen, nee Doherty. On 19th October 1905 at age 16 he joined the 83rd Foot, Royal Irish Rifles service number 3364, and served for 4 years from where he joined the Royal Army Medical Corps for a further 3 years. On 11th August 1914 he joined the Machine Gun Section, AN&MEF stating that he was a clerk and single, giving his mother at William St Drogheda as his next of kin. On 17th August 1914, after he has signed up but before he sailed for Rabaul, he married Amy Blanche Humphries.

He left Rabaul aboard the MORINDA on 30th November 1914 as a guard for German prisoners, and was discharged in Sydney, term expired, on 8th Jan 1915 having completed 151 days service.

On 23rd March 1915 he joined the 19th Battalion, regimental number 1383, this time giving his wife at 29 Bourke St, Redfern as his next of kin. He left Sydney on 25th June 1915 aboard the CERAMIC, arriving in Alexandria on 23rd July. With his battalion he landed at ANZAC Cove on 19th August. He was evacuated from Gallipoli on 1st December aboard the DONGOLA and admitted to hospital in Alexandria. After his release he was transferred to the 5th Battalion on 11th May 1916 and left Alexandria on 2nd August for the UK where he again was hospitalised at the Haberfield Hospital with gastritis. He remained in hospital until 14th Feb 1917 and then returned to Australia on the THEMISTOCLES, leaving Devonport on 4th May, arriving in Sydney on 4th July 1917.

Christopher was discharged from the AIF as medically unfit on 30th July 1917.

During World War 2 he served as a sapper in the Maintenance and Repair Company, service number N71501 from 13th December 1939 till 3rd February 1941.

Christopher died on 11th September 1980.
