Thomas was born in 1893 at Redfern, the son of Richard and Emily Ann Beaman. He enlisted in F Company, AN&MEF on 11<sup>th</sup> August 1914 and stated that he was single, a pipe moulder by trade and gave Mary Bearman, at Blacktown Post Office, as his next of kin.

He returned from Rabaul and was discharged, term expired, on 18<sup>th</sup> January 1915 having served 181 days.



On 21<sup>st</sup> April 1915 Thomas attempted to enlist in the AIF, regimental number 1517, but was classified "Home Service Only" and was discharged "Services no longer required" on 14<sup>th</sup> December after only 211 days service.

Thomas again enlisted in the AIF on 1<sup>st</sup> Feb 1915 as part of the 24<sup>th</sup> Reinforcements of the 2<sup>nd</sup> battalion, regimental number 7214. He left Australia aboard the OSTERLEY on 10<sup>th</sup> Feb 1917, disembarking at Plymouth on 11<sup>th</sup> April 1917. He arrived in France on 23<sup>rd</sup> August 1917, transferring to the 36<sup>th</sup> Battalion.

On 13<sup>th</sup> October 1917, at Passchendaele, he was wounded, receiving a gunshot wound to the left hand. He was admitted to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Western General Hospital, Newport, not returning to his unit until 11<sup>th</sup> March 1918.

On 30<sup>th</sup> April he was transferred to the 33<sup>rd</sup> Battalion and shortly afterwards, on 23<sup>rd</sup> May, he was again wounded at Villers-Bretonneux and admitted to the Red Cross Hospital at Taplow, UK. On resumption of duties he was transferred to the 34<sup>th</sup> Battalion, joining that unit in France on 27<sup>th</sup> September 1918.

On 16<sup>th</sup> Nov 1918 he was appointed Lance Corporal and on 4<sup>th</sup> July 1919 returned to Australia aboard the WILTSHIRE, arriving in Sydney on 19<sup>th</sup> August. He was discharged on 27<sup>th</sup> September 1919.

In 1926 he married Dorothy Edith Rogers at Newtown.

Thomas died at the Repatriation Hospital, Concord on  $31^{\text{st}}$  July 1970.
