## 184 Aubrey Abbott

Charles Lydiard Aubrey Abbott was born on 4<sup>th</sup> May 1886, at St Leonards, the son of Thomas Kingsmill Abbott and Marion Abbott, nee Lydiard. On 9<sup>th</sup> Jan 1908 he was appointed a probationary constable and served in the NSW Police until his enlistment on 11<sup>th</sup> August 1914 into B Coy, AN&MEF.

He enlisted as Aubrey Abbott and on his attestation, he stated that he was a Mounted Policeman, single and gave his father, at Murrulla Station, Wingen, as his next of kin. Whilst in Rabaul, on 21<sup>st</sup> October 1914 he was "detailed to assist at stables in charge of Native Police."

Aubrey returned from Rabaul and was discharged, term expired, on 4<sup>th</sup> March 1915 having completed 206 days service.

On 23<sup>rd</sup> March 1915 he enlisted in the 12<sup>th</sup> Light Horse, regimental number 419 and was promoted corporal on 1<sup>st</sup> June. On 13<sup>th</sup> June he sailed from Sydney aboard the SUEVIC for the Middle East. Whilst on Gallipoli he was transferred to the 7<sup>th</sup> Light Horse on 29<sup>th</sup> August 1915 and appointed Second Lieutenant on 28<sup>th</sup> October and promoted to Lieutenant on 28<sup>th</sup> Jan 1916.

In June 1916 whilst on duty in the Sinai he was taken ill and evacuated to hospital in the UK. There he married an Australian country girl, Hilda Gertrude Harnett at Westminster Cathedral on 24<sup>th</sup> October 1916.

He was in action at the Charge at Beersheba in 1917 and in early in 1918 he served a period as Adjutant for the 4<sup>th</sup> Light Horse and was promoted Captain on 1<sup>st</sup> May. On 4<sup>th</sup> May 1918 he received a gunshot wound to his thigh when his horse was shot from under him.

In June 1918 he returned to the  $12^{th}$  Light Horse before returning to Australia, having his appointment terminated on  $13^{th}$  Feb 1920, and subsequently resigning from the police force on  $4^{th}$  June the same year.

In 1925 he became a Federal Member of Parliament and served as Minister for Home Affairs from 1928 to 1929 when the govt was defeated. About this time he became very active in the Old Guard and following his retirement from parliament, he was appointed Administrator of the Northern Territory in 1937. He was the Administrator during the bombing of Darwin when the administration was moved to Alice Springs. He moved back to Darwin in 1945 and left the Territory on sick leave in May 1946, never to return

Charles died on 30<sup>th</sup> April 1975.
