Thomas was born in Waverley, NSW, in 1895, the son of Thomas Pater Cawley and Elizabeth Cawley, nee Connelly). Both Thomas (1904) and Elizabeth (1901) both died when Thomas was quite young.

He enlisted in the AN&MEF on 11<sup>th</sup> August 1914, stating that he was a labourer, single and gave Mrs E M Challis (believed to be his foster mother) of Moriarty Rd, Chatswood as his next of kin. Thomas returned from Rabaul and was discharged, term expired, on 18<sup>th</sup> Jan 1915.

On 11<sup>th</sup> March 1915 he enlisted in D Company, 19<sup>th</sup> Battalion, regimental number 1156 and left with the battalion aboard the CERAMIC, departing Sydney 25<sup>th</sup> June 1915. The 19<sup>th</sup> Battalion landed at Gallipoli on 19<sup>th</sup> August and Thomas was wounded on 1<sup>st</sup> September, returning to duty on 28<sup>th</sup>.

On 16<sup>th</sup> April 1916 he was transferred to the 5<sup>th</sup> Light Trench Mortar Battery and was promoted corporal on 21<sup>st</sup> April. On 28<sup>th</sup> July Thomas was killed at Pozieres. In a interview, Cpl E B Dickson of the same Battery stated; - "on July 28<sup>th</sup> 1916 at Pozieres Cpl T. W. Cawley was working a gun, with a gun crew, when a shell struck the gun, and he and the rest of the gun crew were killed. Many of them were blown to pieces. I was a runner at the time between this gun and the next, which was

being worked by Cpl. Bernard and a gun crew. We buried all the remains we could find of Cpl. Cawley and his gun crew in the hole which had been made by the shell which killed them."

Thomas was obviously very popular, one member of his unit describing him as - "...a quiet first class fellow and a great favourite with all." And another sating "I knew Cawley well. He was a great character. We called him Old Tom."

Thomas has no known grave but is remembered at the Australian Memorial at Villers- Bretonneux and on Panel 19 at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra.
