John was born in Sydney on 27<sup>th</sup> February 1881, the son of John Edward Craig and Martha Craig, nee Cleland. In 1902 He joined the Cape Police in South Africa and on 24<sup>th</sup> June 1904, on his return from South Africa, he joined the NSW Dept of Health as an attendant and was appointed Senior Attendant on 9<sup>th</sup> April 1910.

On 12<sup>th</sup> August he joined the Army Medical Corps, attached to the AN&MEF, stating that he was a Male Nurse, single and gave his Brother Mr A.B. Craig, at "Craigleigh", Broad Rd, Lower Randwick, as his next of kin.

On 17<sup>th</sup> September 1914 he was promoted corporal and returned from Rabaul and was discharged, term expired, on 18<sup>th</sup> Jan 1915 having completed 160 days service.

On 7<sup>th</sup> April 1915 he joined the 3<sup>rd</sup> Australian General Hospital, regimental number 4360 and was promoted Warrant Office on 1<sup>st</sup> May. He sailed for Suez on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1915 aboard the MOOLAN and whilst on Gallipoli suffered a severe bout of Influenza resulting in him being hospitalised on 19<sup>th</sup> November 1915 and returning to Australia aboard the BORDA leaving Suez on 17<sup>th</sup> August 1916.

On 26<sup>th</sup> October 1916 he resumed duties, leaving Sydney aboard the MARATHON on 31<sup>st</sup> October and disembarking in Plymouth on 9<sup>th</sup> Jan 1917. He went to France on 31<sup>st</sup> October 1917 and joined the 12<sup>th</sup> Field Ambulance before moving to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Australian General Hospital on 6<sup>th</sup> Feb 1918 and appointed Hon Lt QM on 6<sup>th</sup> March. He was Mentioned in Despatches in mid-1916 and after the war suffered a second bout of Influenza and his family was advised that he was dangerously ill.

He recovered and returned to Australia aboard the SARDINIA leaving the UK on 19<sup>th</sup>April 1919 and was subsequently discharged on 12<sup>th</sup> August 1919.

He returned to the Department of Health and in 1919 was a Chief Attendant at The Coast Hospital. He married Eva Milham in 1920 and died in Prince Henry Hospital on 12<sup>th</sup> November 1946. He is buried at the Eastern Suburbs Memorial Park.
