Charles enlisted in F Company, ANMEF, on 11<sup>th</sup> August 1914 and stated that he was 30 years old, was born in Templemore, Tipperary, Ireland and a clerk. He also stated that he was single and gave his sister, Miss G Bentley, Mountland, South Rd, Taunton, UK, as his next of kin. He further stated that he served in Egypt and South Africa, in the British Army, possibly the 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalion, Yorkshire Hussars.

Charles returned from Rabaul and was discharge, term expired, on 4<sup>th</sup> March 1915, having completed 206 days service.

On 15<sup>th</sup> Feb 1915 he joined the 19<sup>th</sup> Battalion under the name Charles Thomas Bentley and on this occasion listed his brother, W Bentley of Cairo, Egypt, as his next of kin. It would appear that he joined the AIF prior to his discharge from the AN&MEF. He sailed with his battalion on 25<sup>th</sup> June 1915 aboard the CERAMIC and was on the Gallipoli Peninsular until the battalion withdrew in December 1915.

On 3<sup>rd</sup> April 1916 he was granted a Commission as 2/Lt transferred to the 56<sup>th</sup> Battalion. On 9<sup>th</sup> September 1916 he was promoted Lieutenant in France and was evacuated sick, on 11<sup>th</sup> December 1916, not rejoining his unit until 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1917. On 5<sup>th</sup> May 1917 he joined the 14<sup>th</sup> Training Battalion. He resigned his Commission on 11<sup>th</sup> October 1918, in consequence of being medically unfit (Albuminuria) and requested his discharge take place in the UK stating that – "My wife is residing in England and is dependent on me and has no desire to go to Australia. I have no dependents or engagements in Australia necessitating my return there."

Some time after the war he moved to ANZAC Farm, Rose de Lac, Manitoba, Canada.
