Henry was born at Leura on 18<sup>th</sup> March 1894, the son of Henry Booth and Mary Anne Booth. Henry had a troubled youth having been sentenced to 6 moths Hard Labour for forgery and uttering on 18<sup>th</sup> August 1911 at age 17. The sentence was suspended under the 1<sup>st</sup> Offenders Act. He was not so fortunate the second time when, on 27<sup>th</sup> May 1913, he was again sentenced to 6 months Hard Labour for stealing.

On 11<sup>th</sup> August 1914 he enlisted in the AN&MEF and gave his occupation as Law Clerk, stating that he was single and gave his mother, Mrs Mary Anne Robson, "Killarney", Thirroul, as his next of kin.

Henry was appointed Lance Corporal on 29<sup>th</sup> Sept 1914 and promoted Corporal on 5<sup>th</sup> Jan 1915. Henry returned from Rabaul and was discharged, time expired, on 18<sup>th</sup> January 1915.

On 3<sup>rd</sup> August 1915 he enlisted as part of the 4<sup>th</sup> Reinforcements of the 19<sup>th</sup> battalion, regimental number 2350. He left Australia aboard the THEMISTOCLES, departing Sydney on 5<sup>th</sup> October 1915. He was taken on strength with the 19<sup>th</sup> Battalion on 8<sup>th</sup> Jan 1916 at Tel-El-Kabir, the battalion having arrived back in Egypt the day before following the evacuation from Gallipoli.

On 14<sup>th</sup> Feb 1916 Henry was appointed Lance Corporal and on 3<sup>rd</sup> November 1916 he transferred to the 17<sup>th</sup> battalion. Between 5<sup>th</sup> October 1917 and 2<sup>nd</sup> March 1918, he was attached to the No 2 Officer Cadet Battalion at Cambridge. On his report at the completion of the course it was noted – "Can do well if he tries."

On 1<sup>st</sup> April he received his commission as a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant and rejoined his battalion on 5<sup>th</sup> May 1918. He was promoted Lieutenant on 18<sup>th</sup> August 1918 and was gassed on the front on 3<sup>rd</sup> October 1918.

On 15<sup>th</sup> May 1919 Henry boarded the YPUINGA for home and arrived in Sydney on 5<sup>th</sup> July 1919 and his commission was terminated on 12<sup>th</sup> December 1919.

In 1922 at Randwick, he married Edith Pearle Spicer and on 27<sup>th</sup> December 1939 he was mobilised from the reserve of Officers, service number N60082, and was appointed a Lieutenant. He was discharged as medically unfit with Bronchitis on 17<sup>th</sup> October 1940.

Henry died on 3<sup>rd</sup> August 1978.
